Jamieson Webster Uncanny Conversions

On the Authors

Through the discussion of a case burdened by uncanny experiences, and an investigation into the literature on the clinical treatment of uncanny phenomena, this paper seeks an outline of the uncanny in psychoanalytic treatment - something which Freud approached solely through the vehicle of literature. The uncanny is placed in relation to somatic phenomena, attacks on thinking, effects on the level of the gaze, and repressed representations that return, seemingly, from the outside. As well, some aspects of what the uncanny has to do with sexuality is brought to the surface. Finally, a case of Jacques Lacan, from his seminar on Anxiety, is used as a countercase to the uncanny, a vision of the cure for what ails us in uncanny experience and all its attendant anxieties.

Rishi Goval

is Director of the Medicine, Literature and Society major at the Institute of Comparative Literature and Society at Columbia University New York. He is currently an Attending Physician in the Emergency Department at Columbia University Medical Center and a Visiting Professor at the University of Southern Denmark in Odense. His research, writing and teaching focuses on the reciprocal transformations that result when new ideas about health, disease and the body find forms of expression in fiction and memoirs. His most

recent work explores the political, aesthetic, and social dimensions of the representation of physical trauma in literature. His writing has appeared in *The Living Handbook of Narratology, Aktuel Forskning. Litteratur, Kultur og Medier*, and *The Los Angeles Review of Books* among other places.

Andrea Krauß is Professor of German at New York University. Her research interests include the intersection of literature, philosophy, and aesthetics from the eighteenth century to the present as well as literary theory and methodology. She is the author of Zerbrechende Tradierung: Zu Kontexten des Schauspiels »IchundIch« von Else Lasker-Schüler (Passagen, 2002) and Lenz unter anderem: Aspekte einer Theorie der Konstellation (Diaphanes, 2011). She edited special issues of MLN (Constellations, 2011; Avant-garde revisited: Else Lasker-Schüler, 2017) and has published articles on authors such as Brockes, Hamann, Lessing, Lenz, Goethe, Eichendorff, Jean Paul, Rahel Levin Varnhagen, Nelly Sachs, Celan, and Sebald.

Michael G. Levine is Professor of German and Comparative Literature at Rutgers University. He is the author most recently of *Atomzertrümmerung*. Zu einem Gedicht von Paul Celan as well as A Weak Messianic Power: Figures of a Time to Come in Benjamin, Derrida and Celan, The Belated Witness: Literature, Testimony, and the Question of Holocaust Survival and Writing Through Repression: Literature, Censorship, Psychoanalysis. He has also published articles on film and human rights trials, translation theory, the graphic novel, and Holocaust literature, film and the poetics of witnessing. Currently, he is at work on a collection of essays in German on Paul Celan.

Orna Ophir

is a Psychoanalyst at Private Practice in New York and Tel Aviv as well as Adjunct Associate Professor at *The Humanities Center*, Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore and at *Weill Cornell Medical College* in New York. Publications include: *Psychosis, Psychoanalysis and Psychiatry in Postwar USA: On the Borderland of Madness* (Routledge, 2015).

Oliver Simons is Professor of Germanic Languages at Columbia University New York. His teaching and research interests focus on literature and science, post-colonial studies, the »end« around 1800, and literary theories. His publications include a comparative study on spatial concepts in philosophy, empirical psychology, art history, and literature around 1900 (Raumgeschichten. Topographien der Moderne in Philosophie, Wissenschaft und Literatur, Munich 2007, Wilhelm Fink Verlag), a book on literary theories, was published in 2009 (Literaturtheorien zur Einführung, Hamburg 2009, Junius Verlag) as well as collections he co-edited on German colonialism, Kafka, and Ingeborg Bachmann. Most recently he coedited the The Oxford Handbook of Carl Schmitt, bringing together insights from a variety of disciplines, including law, literature, and political science. In his current book project, tentatively titled The Ends of the Eighteenth Century, he examines how textual endings around 1800 correspond with theories of causality and conclusion.

Elisabeth Strowick is Professor of German and Chair of the Department of German at New York University. Her areas of expertise are German literature, culture, and thought from the 19th century to the present, with a special emphasis on literary theory, psychoanalysis, aesthetics, rhetoric, and the poetics of knowledge. She is the author of Gespenster des Realismus: Zur literarischen Wahrnehmung von

Wirklichkeit (Fink, 2019), Sprechende Körper – Poetik der Ansteckung. Performativa in Literatur und Rhetorik (Fink, 2009), and Passagen der Wiederholung. Kierkegaard – Lacan – Freud (Metzler, 1999). She has (co-)edited numerous volumes and special issues of peer-reviewed journals, such as the MLN special issues Literature and the Sense of Possibility (2010) and Curse and Modernity (2016).

Anthony Vidler is an architectural historian and critic. He is Professor at the Irwin S. Chanin School of Architecture at The Cooper Union in New York. He has researched and extensively published on the work of Claude-Nicolas Ledoux, from: Architecture and Social Reform at the End of the Ancien Régime (Cambridge, Mass.: MIT Press, 1990) to: Claude-Nicolas Ledoux: Architecture and Utopia in the Age of the French Revolution (Basel: Birkhäuser, 2006). He is also the author of: The Architectural Uncanny: Essays in the Modern Unhomely (Cambridge, Mass.: MIT Press, 1992).

Jamieson Webster is a psychoanalyst in New York and author of *Conversion Disorder* (Columbia UP, 2018), *Stay, Illusion!* (Pantheon, 2013), *The Life and Death of Psychoanalysis* (Routlege, 2011) and is currently working on a book on Jacques

Lacan with Marcus Coelen. She has written often for *The New York Times, The New York Review of Books, Artforum, Cabinet Magazine, Spike Art Quarterly,* and in many psychoanalytic journals. She currently teaches at The New School for Social Research, and is a member of IPTAR and *Das Unbehagen*.

Anke Wenzel is an artist living in Hamburg. The drawings presented here were produced during and after a stay of several months in Tanzania: psychodelic patterns, starring in an uncanny manner, as if figures and forms in a carpet; secret signs of shamanic practice; notes taken during a delusion of heterotopia; scores for the enticing songs of
